
The funds raised by the Auction are now earmarked for the InSEA World Congress, Brisbane 21-26 September, and to assist remote area art teachers and third world country art educators to attend. The selection criteria is yet to be devised by QATA and information on how to apply for assistance should be published soon.

The InSEA World Congress Planning Committee has also agreed on an incentive price for QATA members at the Congress due to their fund raising efforts. It is hoped that all teachers of art in Queensland will avail themselves of this incentive and join QATA. (and hopefully be more actively involved.)

QATA Early Bird registration for the InSEA Congress is \$445 for the 5 day program: compared to \$495 as the listed price. This includes morning and afternoon tea and lunch. A very good deal!





# ARTS TEACHERS HAMPERED BY LACK OF TRAINING

Visual arts teachers in Australia are struggling with insufficient training and professional development to provide them with the necessary skills to perform effectively. President of the Australian Institute of Art Education (AIAE), Ms Adele Flood, said that the national curriculum introduced in 1994/95, which required the teaching of the five arts areas of music, theatre, dance, visual arts and media, from pre-school to year 12, had resulted in a nationally-driven agenda for change.

"While most States are modifying the profiles to their own needs, the expectations on visual arts teachers are very demanding," she said.
"Teachers nowadays are expected to have a greater proficiency in a broader range of arts skills, yet, due to the underfunding of teacher training, they are receiving less training and professional development to prepare them for the classroom."

"This is also leading to less and less arts of any real depth being taught in our schools," Ms Flood said.

Ms Flood said, however, that the staging in Brisbane later this year of an international congress on visual arts education would create training and professional development opportunities for teachers.

The AIAE will host the 30th international Society of Education through Art (InSEA) World Congress at the Brisbane Convention & Exhibition Centre, September 21 - 26, 1999. The Congress was last held in Australia 21 years ago, in Adelaide.

Ms Flood said that the Congress would provide an opportunity for Australian visual arts teachers and academics to meet educators from other countries, share ideas, collaborate on future work and discover new ways of teaching and learning aspects of visual arts. She said that workshops held in conjunction with the Congress would help art educators to learn how to teach the various aspects of visual arts.

"The congress will raise consciousness about visual arts, which is just as important as teaching English and mathematics," Ms Flood said. "Art unlocks creativity and a lateral method of thinking, which is applicable to other areas of learning.

"Brisbane was chosen as the venue for the Congress, largely due to the high rofile of the Arts in the community and the support of Arts Queensland and Education Queensland."

The theme for the 1999 Congress is Cultures and Transitions, which will highlight the similarities and differences between the visual arts and its education in delegate countries. It is expected that 1,500 delegates, from Il over the world, will attend the Congress. Major national and international children's exhibitions will form part of the Congress, which also runs concurrently with the Asia-Pacific Triennial at the Queensland Art Gallery.



Professor Mary Kalantzis Dean of the Faculty of Education, Language and Community Services at Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology. Formerly, she was Director of the Institute of Interdisciplinary Studies at James Cook University of North Queensland, Director of the Centre for Workplace Communication Culture at the University Technology, Sydney and a Senior Research Fellow at the Centre for Multicultural Studies at the University of Wollongong. She was a part time Commissioner of the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission from 1994 to 1997 and Chair of the Queensland Ethnic Affairs Ministerial Advisory Committee from 1995 to 1997.

Professor Kalantzis' **Qualifications** include: B.A.(hons) Dip. Macquarie University, 1980. Majors in history and linguistics with first class honors in history: Ph.D., White Man Drawing Dreaming: Australia's Cultural Boundaries. Changes in Commonwealth **Immigration** Aboriginal Policies, 1945-1967, School of History, Philosophy and Politics, Macquarie University, 1991. During the 1990-1991 academic year she was a Fulbright Scholar in Residence, Keene State College, University of New Hampshire, System, New Hampshire, USA.

Queensland school children are being asked to draw or paint their version of Queensland or Australian culture as a special gift for visiting conference delegates.

The works of art will be given to international delegates visiting Queensland in September to attend a major congress on visual arts education.

The 30th International Society of Education through Art (InSEA) World Congress is being held at the Brisbane Convention & Exhibition Centre, September 21 - 26, 1999.

The Congress aims to provide an opportunity for Australian visual arts teachers and academics to meet educators from other countries, share ideas, collaborate on future work and discover new ways of teaching and learning aspects of visual arts.

The delegate gifts are being organised by the Queensland Art Teachers'
Association, in conjunction with Education Queensland. Co-ordinator of the gifts, Ms Deborah Cohen, said that each visitor would receive an original work of art as part of their conference program.

"The artwork needs to be A4 in size, not folded, and in a medium which won't smudge," Ms Cohen said. "Any Queensland school child, from preschool to year 12, can submit an item, and every student who sends a piece of art will receive a Certificate of Recognition."

The artworks must include the name, age and grade of the artist, the school address, the title of the work, and a brief description of the work.

# **Greetings from Central Office**

Welcome back to what is shaping up to be a wonderful year for art education. I am really looking forward to the exciting professional development on offer in Queensland this year. I hope I see many familiar faces at these events and to catch up on all the news and gossip.

# InSEA World Congress: Brisbane Convention Centre, 21-26 September 1999

Education Queensland has appointed a Development Officer to maximise the benefit of the InSEA World Congress for Queensland schools.

Mr Les Hooper from Redbank Plains SHS will take up this position from 12 April - 17 December 1999.

Mr Hooper's appointment involves planning, promoting and coordinating maximum InSEA 99 involvement with and benefits to Queensland schools, youth and interstate students in InSEA 99.

He will work with InSEA 99 officers to select schools to participate in the youth activities of the Congress, oversee the production of curriculum related outcomes of the performance component of InSEA 99, manage the Education program established as part of InSEA 99 and ensure appropriate follow-up and evaluation of youth involvement in InSEA 99.

An important role for Les is to manage the pre Congress Field Work program involving visits to schools by interstate and international artists, art educators, and other guests to ensure maximum participation in non-metropolitan Queensland.

The Field Work program will take place from 13-17 September 1999. Schools wishing to nominate for the Field Work program should contact me, Deborah Cohen or Les ASAP.

Schools/ Teachers will be responsible to host the delegate(s) to visit their school. This would mean that schools or networks would cover the travel costs from Brisbane and accommodation costs of the selected visiting delegate(s) while they are working with the schools/networks.

The school/network will be able to negotiate with the delegate(s) about what their role will be in the program. Many of the delegates are from a University background but some are also artists in their own right. delegates address issues in primary or secondary art education or both. The delegates come from all over world. Les will be responsible for matching up delegates and schools and developing an effective schedule of access visits across the state.

# 1999 MINISTER'S AWARDS FOR EXCELLENCE IN ART:


Information re the 1999

The Sourcebooks will provide the details of the scope and sequence of the KLA content and have the potential to provide exemplars of effective curriculum organisation, planning and assessment.



## TASK OBJECTIVES:

# THE MAJOR PAINTING TO BE COMPLETED; MARC CHAGALL

- A After studying various artists from your text book etc, you need to experiment with mark making, drawing. Collage, etc., in your visual diary and create a few ideas on how you will approach your final painting. This means type of composition, mood, treatment, colour, etc.
- B Your final piece can be purely 2D and look quite flat etc., or it could be 3D having a lot of depth etc. This is your choice...[ perhaps have 2D and 3D elements]
- C You might be influenced by one special artist you have studied, and use a similar approach or method and incorporate some of their ideas into yours.

# Students will learn to;

Your 'skills' will increase with practice and patience. A lot of concentration and patience is required and your basic skills will improve....keep this in mind as you work.


# **Special Eyeline Magazine Offer**
