
We will discover how:

- position can be physical or based on experience or ideologies, and our position or proximity to something affects our perspective.
- the point in time we are looking from affects our perspective too, for example, when we look backwards (into the past) we may apply a retrospective or nostalgic lens.
- aspects of something relate to one another and to the whole (relative perspective) allow us to make judgements, based on what we already know or feel.
- finding a new perspective can unlock creativity.

As audiences, educators, and makers, the perspectives that we bring to each activity promotes a world that is inclusive, empathetic, rich, and intelligent. This is one of the unique qualities of our subject in promoting the diversity of voices and stories across our world.

QATA is a strong and growing association. We have been working hard to meet the needs of educators from across the state and are confident the program will enrich your professional learning, build bridges between art practice and curriculum, and give opportunities to make connections with colleagues, leaving you feeling renewed and excited about the future of Visual Art education in our state. We have extraordinary opportunities to reflect on our theme, perspectives, starting with our two incredible keynote speakers, Dr Lindy Lee on Friday, and Daniel Boyd on Saturday. Dr Lindy Lee's decades long national and international practice has focused on Investigating and questioning multiplicity of self. Her works are thoughtful objects where meaning emerges from sustained meditation. Daniel Boyd's work reveals the complexity of perspectives through which political, cultural and personal memory is composed. Both are exceptional speakers to focus our theme of perspectives.







To start, on Thursday night we will gather at the Institute of Modern Art, Fortitude Valley to launch the conference with an opening event and artist's talk. This is an exceptional opportunity offered by the IMA to our delegates and we hope you can join us. Please book for this event on registration to secure your ticket.

While we hope that you can join us for the entire program, every day is a fabulous opportunity to learn and enrich your practice. On Friday our focus will be on curriculum matters and our experts include, QCAA, art teacher peers and artists. My work examines the visual phenomena which occur when intersecting and opposing directional lines are layered on separate parallel planes. On a conceptual level the horizontal plane is the visible, tangible, form based exterior world. The vertical is non-visible, separate from space and time, the private interior. The combination of these two separate spaces creates the structure of our character and our individual experience of reality. Through the layering of simple, repetitive mark making I create layered complexity, form and movement, which invites the work to be experienced from multiple perspectives.

I completed Honours in Visual Arts, with a major in glass, at the Canberra School of Art in 2008. Since graduating, I have participated in numerous group exhibitions nationally and internationally. Most recently I was the winner of the Queanbeyan City Art Prize, and a finalist in the 2021 Byron Arts Magazine Prize, the 2018 Waterhouse Natural Science Art Prize and the 2017 Hindmarsh Glass Prize. My work has been acquired by Australia's National Art Glass Collection as well as the European Museum of Modern Glass in Germany, and the Kaplan-Ostergaard Glass Collection at Palm Springs Art Museum. I have been a full time Visual Art teacher for 3 years now and currently work at Good Samaritan Catholic College in Bli Bli. I am also in the process of building a glass studio with my husband on our property near Eumundi.

Regional Teacher Bursary

CLERMONT STATE HIGH SCHOOL

I am a beginner teacher in a small, rural and remote town and have been writting the content from scratch with the help of my HOD (who's maths trained).

I am desperate to pick the brains of the art community, be inspired and network so I can develop ongoing support and deliver the art curriculum to the level my students deserve.

Being a mining and farming town, the schools budget does not prioritise the arts, however I understand the importance of art for connection, empathy and viewing the world from different perspectives. I would love the opportunity to grow and learn to support and inspire my students.

Clermont is a beautiful small community 120kms north-west of Emerald (955kms from Brisbane) with a mixture of farming and mining families. Clermont State High school is just shy of 200 students and 23 teachers living up to their moto of "Small but Mighty". The tight knit community allows for involvement across a range of groups and activities such as tennis, netball, rugby, the artlink club and pony club. Clermont is home to the endangered Northern hairy-nosed wombat, and the town celebrates and brings awareness to these mighty creatures once a year with the Wombat festival. This is a 3-day festival where you have the chance to explore your arty side by painting, knitting, sewing or creating wooden and wire wombats.



Regional Teacher Bursary

Catherine mcauley college

I am the Head of Year 7 and the only Visual Art teacher at Catherine McAuley College in Mackay. Our school opened last year, and we currently have only year 7 and year 8 students. Prior to CMC I worked for Education Queensland from 2004 in several different roles and locations. Due to a range of circumstances, I have been teaching Food Technology for the past 10 years in the state system (despite being a trained Visual Arts Teacher), so I am a little out of the loop with the visual arts scene. Fast forward to changing to the Catholic system I am now back in the Visual Art world and could not be happier! I am really looking forward to learning new things and making new connections at QATACON. I am so grateful to have received this year's bursary to help me do this.




South Bank campus map





FRIDAY Keynote

Venue: Tafe C Auditorium 8:30-10:15am



Lindy Lee is a Chinese-Australian artist who has exhibited extensively nationally and internationally. Lee's practice explores her Chinese roots through the philosophies of Taoism and Buddhism which emphasises humanity's close relationship to nature and the universe. Her work investigates the interdependence between the material and the immaterial. The use of materials, images and processes in her work can be seen as a metaphor for the porous nature of 'being in the world', where the boundaries between 'self' and 'other', 'cultures' and 'societies' are permeable. Lee is a founding member of Gallery 4A in Sydney's Chinatown. She is a former board member of Artspace and the Australian Centre of Photography, former president of the Asian Australian Artists Association, former deputy chair of the Visual Arts and Craft Board of the Australia Council and has been Artist Trustee of the Art Gallery of New South Wales.

Lindy Lee has just been commissioned to create the 40th anniversary work for the NGA (National Gallery of Australia, Canberra). The work, Ouroboros will become a beacon for the NGA and will be delivered in 2024.

Saturday Keynote Daniel Boyd

Daniel Boyd has been exhibiting in numerous solo and group exhibitions in Australia and overseas since 2005. He is the first Indigenous Australian to win the prestigious Bulgari Art Award in 2014. His first major survey show in an Australian public institution Daniel Boyd: Treasure Island opened at the Art Gallery of New South Wales in June 2022. Boyd will present his first comprehensive solo exhibition in Europe at the Martin-Gropius-Bau in Berlin next year. Boyd's paintings are held in major public collections in Australia including: the National Gallery of Australia, Canberra; the Museum of Contemporary Art, Sydney; the Art Gallery of New South Wales, Sydney; the National Gallery of Victoria, Melbourne; Queensland Art Gallery | Gallery of Modern Art, Brisbane; Cairns Regional Gallery, Cairns; TarraWarra Museum of Art, Victoria, as well as notable international collections such as the Samdani Art Foundation, Dhaka, Bangladesh and the Kadist Collection in Paris, France.

SCIENCE THROUGH THE ART LENS

How to interconnect science and technology into art by exploring the role of creativity.

Living Faith has been developing a play-based approach to STEAM subjects using visual arts as a focal point. This presentation will explore some of the hands-on transdisciplinary units of inquiry that have been developed. These include creating art with chemistry, designing robots that draw, using heat transfer to create an art portfolio and launching rockets.

Using the design cycle coupled with a growth mindset there has been a focus on developing curiosity, experimenting, exploring concepts and engaging in sensory play; empowering students through creative thinking and encouraging them to have agency in their work.

RUBBISH/RICHES/REALITY?

This unit was based around the QATACON23 resource, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art in the Classroom.

Year 6 explored the Erub Arts Collaborative and their inspirational response to the environmental problem caused by ghost nets. This led to the realisation that some people's rubbish is someone else's treasure, it's all in your perspective.

Looking from this angle students used fleece, which on its own doesn't really do much, but when felted becomes a strong, useful cloth. Students learnt to felt in two ways, a basic flat felt and a more advanced method of felting which created a bowl. As part of this lesson we delved into some basic colour theory, looking at warm/cool colours and the effects they can have on how we feel.

Students were in awe at the results of the felting, particularly when they pulled the stocking away from the felt bowls and the organically created felt was revealed with its swirls of intertwined patterns.

The flat felt pieces formed the basis of a turtle which the students crafted from the felt, net, wadding, bubble wrap and other found materials. The bowls were turned into sea anemones using shredded paper. Everyone's turtles and sea anemones became part of a giant installation which highlighted the plight of marine animals, nets, rubbish and humanity.

Students wrote artist statements to describe their artwork: how they created it, what the big idea behind the work was, what the student's personal goals were and their overall thoughts. These statements along with a photograph of themselves and their art piece were mounted behind the installation.

WELLBEING AND TEACHING ART

Wellbeing and Positive Education are becoming more of a focus in our schools as we help students to learn to navigate our changing world and become the best they can be. Art Teaching is a fabulous forum for embedding the principles of positive psychology as we inherently help our students to thrive as they learn. This presentation outlines a framework for positive education and shows how you can (and probably already are) helping students to thrive within that framework. Looking at 3 aspects of the PERMAH framework: positive relationships, positive accomplishment and positive engagement, this presentation will outline simple strategies (some of which you may already use) and explain how they are important for student wellbeing.

Positive Relationships in the Art classroom can be facilitated between teacher and student, and student to student to help build a sense of belonging and psychological safety. Positive Accomplishment in the Art classroom can be facilitated using growth mindset, striving for goals and achieving success. Positive Engagement in the Art classroom can be facilitated through creating an environment that helps students feel grounded and to find flow so they can truly engage with the activity. These strategies then help students to feel safe to take creative risks to explore their creative selves. Teacher attitude and role modelling is critical to students feeling safe in the Art classroom and Positive Education strategies will enhance your understanding to support our students.



1. The Lottery - PAEA Visual Art teachers' Annual Exhibition (March then December)

Supporting Art Educators to maintain their own arts practice, the focus is on a fun and relaxed group exhibition. Members register and attend the gallery initially for the "lottery" draw, a random allocation of a blank art surface which doubles as a social event. They return a completed artwork, nine months later for an exhibition launch and PAEA Xmas party.

2. Receive<Respond [R<R] — A PAEA, Cairns
Regional Council, QATA and NorthSite
collaboration exhibition and artist workshops
for Student (10 to 12) and Young Creative (18 —
25) Exhibition Semester 1. Students and YC from
across Far North Queensland apply by submitting
an artwork and brief artist statement created in
the last 12 months. Applications are considered

with 30 students/YC works selected and then paired. Selected students 'receive' the image of their paired Student / YC. A new work is then created in response. Both works are exhibited and the magic happens at the opening when the Students/YC see the works and meet responding artist for the first time.

3. Refuel(and Reflect) - Annual PAEA artist Workshops (Term 2)

Running since 2014, two local emerging artists and two national artists present a full day workshop and artist talk to FNQ art educators. Hosted by local High schools, including students and YC selected in Receive Respond.






